Another fundraising event was our Antiques & Collectible Sale held in conjunction with the Annual Grange Strawberry Festival in June.

In July we partnered with The Dudley Woman’s Club and The Dudley Historical Commission for a Historic Scavenger Hunt. This proved to be a fun family day. Teams were given a list of 12 historic sites in Dudley and the teams who found them in the least amount of time won prizes. The fun part was people found places in Dudley they had never known existed! The money raised has been used to install a sign that explains the Stevens Linen monument in front of the barn.

On a Sunday afternoon In August the “Hill” was filled with the sounds of The Grey Whisker Pickers, a local group of banjo playing, storytelling guys, who captivated everyone with their talents.

In October we held our First Annual Craft Fair. I can say First Annual because it was such a success that we are sure to do it again. 21 crafters showcased primitive

We also held a raffle of two antique chairs, donated by Peg Pedersen, which were given new rush seats by Ed Bazinet and a hand painted scene of early Dudley done by Deborah Bazinet.

If you are sensing a theme here, you are right. Fundraising is an important part of keeping the Tavern going. Your membership is crucial, and we thank you who have supported us over the years, but never knowing what a 210 year old building will need, it’s always necessary to add to the coffers. Fortunately, we didn’t have any major repairs this year, just the usual maintenance to contend with.

Speaking of the history of the Tavern, we celebrated the 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Black Tavern Historical Society this year. It was 30 years ago that a dedicated group of people formed to save the Tavern from the wrecking ball. We can never thank these historic minded people enough for their work and dedication, except to honor them by carrying on their dreams and keeping the Tavern a special place on Dudley Hill.

Like any organization, change is inevitable. There have

been 2 changes to the Board of Directors this year. After many years of keeping us on the financial straight and narrow, Peg Pedersen stepped down as Treasurer, but remains on the Board. Will Mosely has taken over these duties. Also, John Vanderaa, has retired from the Board. We thank these two individuals for the many years they have given to the Board of Directors and the Tavern.

### Looking Back on the 2013 Programs

During the past year, the program committee offered a wide array of events beginning with our own actor/historian Ed Bazinet who discussed melodramas/plays of the 19th century, focusing on "Uncle Tom's Cabin", and an excerpt from "The Drunkard," with members taking parts and finally the audience participating in the "you will pay the rent" skit. Not having attended, I am unable to offer my own critique but hearsay has it that it was a most entertaining evening.

In April, caretaker, cabinetmaking and civil war expert Bob Ducharme, gave a fascinating history of the Black Tavern from 1804 to the present, enhanced with old photographs and stories of folks who lived at the Tavern.

The May event was a bit of a bust, as it was not until we were half way through the Native American documentary that we realized it was not the one advertised and then, as if protesting, the video began to skip and stop and skip and stop...so it ended prematurely with a good laugh and some relief, allowing those present to take advantage of the moment by catching up with one another on local matters of great importance.

The annual Third Grade field trip to the Tavern, once again offered students a real feel into the hardships, inconveniences and joys of early 19<sup>th</sup> century life, including those of an outhouse (located behind the Tavern)...when even the most distracted students suddenly became attentive on the subject, stifling giggles, as they tried to imagine life without indoor plumbing!

Due to the generosity of the Dudley Cultural Council, folks were able to enjoy two spirited barn concerts from local musicians. "The Grey Whisker Pickers" had everyone singing and tapping their feet to old

favorites and Mark Mandeville and Raianne Richards lulled folks into

tears and then laughter with their beautiful repertoire.

In August, for those daring enough, folks joined in for an old time contra dance, led by the Old Sturbridge Village Contra Dance Group who were dressed in full vintage costumes, complete with their own musician. Even those who declined to shake a leg, enjoyed watching all the saching and swinging of the reels and squares.

October 2013 was the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Black Tavern Historical Society and was celebrated with an authentic hearth-cooked feast, beautifully prepared and presented by Old Sturbridge Village historian, Linda Oakley. All enjoyed the period music played by Linda's husband,

### **2013 Maintenance at the Black Tavern**

As we look back on the maintenance efforts this past year at the Black Tavern, we see that for the first time in several years we have needed no major repairs such as roof replacement, furnace replacement or sill replacement. . Nevertheless. our stewardship of this wonderful old building has continued with many smaller upgrading projects, as well as numerous projects that contribute to making the Tavern the active and welcoming building that it is.

Last December, as part of our ongoing effort to reduce heating costs, temporary storm windows were constructed and installed in the kitchen area of the Tavern and numerous air leaks were sealed in an attempt to reduce winter heat loss in the cold north end of the building. Additional moldings were also constructed and installed along with caulking to help seal the cold air leaking in around the 208-year-old windows in the meeting room.

During the winter months , work on the Tavern proper is difficult as folks who rent the Tavern for functions are frequently using the Tavern making inside work difficult. The cold weather precludes working outside, so our caretaker Bob uses this time to work on items to upgrade the apartment. Recent upgrades this past winter include rebuilding five door frames and replacing those doors in January. In February, wainscoting was added to two rooms.

With the arrival of spring, yard cleanup was started. Yard

machines were serviced, gardens were raked and mulched, and lawns aerated, limed, and fertilized. The yard and porch furniture were repainted and the picnic tables were brought out of winter storage.

In May, flowers were planted in the gardens and our traditional hanging baskets were hung on the front porch. A drainage pipe was installed to divert water away from the foundation; the water was seeping into the cellar.

The Tavern was given a good spring-cleaning in preparation for our annual Third Grade Visit and several of the windows were washed. (*See trivia question about Tavern windows at the end of this article*). Patriotic bunting was installed on the front of the Tavern and the annex/shoe-shop in preparation for Memorial Day and summer activities.

In June a much-needed renovation of the Tavern kitchen was undertaken. This was the last room on the first floor to be redone as part of our ongoing 3-year renovation project. These rooms had not been repainted or upgraded since the original Tavern restoration in the 1980's. Hugh Cushing repainted the entire kitchen including walls, woodwork, and ceiling.

A big thanks to Paul Cournoyer of Central Floor Covering of Dudley for his donation and installation of new flooring in the kitchen and the bathroom as well. Thanks also go out to Jay Spahl of Spahl plumbing, who donated the necessary plumbing work so that the new flooring could be installed under the present bathroom fixtures.

The rest of the kitchen was completed by Bob Ducharme, using some of the several hundred feet of wood donated by his brother Walter. Bob constructed additional cabinets, which provided much-needed storage. A new microwave oven cabinet was also created.

To cap off the restoration, John Vanderaa, our own clock aficionado, presented us with a new kitchen clock he made bearing an image of Hezekiah Healy's original Tavern sign.

This new kitchen area is not only a pleasant visual upgrade but also makes life easier for renters and caterers who use it.

In July we received a donation of an air conditioner from Chuck Squier. It was installed in the Taproom and was a nice addition to the one we presently have in the Meeting room. Although the air conditioners are not used on a regular basis they make renting of the Tavern

more feasible for those wishing to rent it in extremely hot summer weather.

July is also the time many perennials on the property need to be divided and either replanted elsewhere or given away. The gardens were also given uplift with the addition of compost recycled from last years fall leaf removal.

In September, we start to think of the upcoming winter season. All our outdoor furniture along with picnic tables were put in storage for the winter. A successful workday was held and many volunteers finished scraping and repainting the front porch floor. This had not been done in about ten years. At the same time the barn was emptied of tables and stored materials in preparation for our fall concert. Later in the month repairs were made to the concrete sidewalk and railings at the rear entrance to the Tavern, and firewood was brought in and stored for use during winter rentals. Bob Ducharme designed and constructed a new settle/wood-storage box for the hearth room to replace the old wooden crate being used.

In November, before the cold settled in his workshop, Bob used more of the donated wood to construct his final Tavern projects for the season. First was the construction of two trash containers that would cover the unsightly plastic wastebaskets used in the hearth room during functions and rentals.

About the same time Ed and Linda Bazinet donated the antique top to a stand-up desk similar to the one that Bob had wanted to make for quite some time. With the top now in hand, Bob designed and constructed a matching base. The completed piece is presently located in the taproom and holds our guest book.

Finally, in closing out our year on December 3, a dedication ceremony took place, noting a new sign funded by the Dudley Women's Club that describes the Stevens Mill complex cornerstones now displayed on our front lawn.

### **Powder Puff Carpentry**

Last summer Sandy Peterson, knowing that I am a retired woodworking teacher, asked if some day I would be willing to teach some woodworking skills to a small group of ladies. After giving it a thought, I said why not? So this past fall, Sandy, Elaine Martin, and Sarah White embarked on a woodworking adventure in the Black Tavern Annex/Woodshop. Initially, I suggested that we start with a small project of their own choosing made of pine in order to learn the basic skills. After I asked for suggestions, Sandy suggested building potting benches. Yikes! A pretty ambitious project for a group of novices with no woodworking experience. After giving it some thought, I decided that it would probably work since it would not require the finesse of building a piece of furniture yet would still involve constructing a variety of woodworking joints while using several different power tools. The only drawback that I could see would be the need for a large amount of materials to complete 4 projects. We then received a pleasant surprise when during conversation one

evening at a “Wednesday on the Porch”, Charlie Perzanowski offered to donate some rough sawn oak that he had cut on his sawmill for our use. After drawing a plan, I constructed a prototype for the ladies to follow and we began construction in early September, meeting one morning a week. I must say that I was impressed with the skills that the ladies developed while using such power tools as surfacer, radial arm saw, power miter saw, drill press, router in addition to the expertise learned in using several hand tools. After 6 Thursday morning classes the new woodworkers completed their projects and took them home hopefully to be used during the coming spring planting season.

### **From the Innkeepers**

We have once again seen a successful year relating to rental use of the Black Tavern. The rental of the Tavern not only continues to be one of our major fundraisers, but also gives us an opportunity to showcase this “Gem on the Hill” to folks from near and far not familiar with it on an ongoing basis.

Over the past year the Tavern has been the venue for graduation parties, birthday parties, Christmas parties, and baby and bridal showers. It has also been used by organizations such as the Dudley Woman’s Club, the French River Connection, and the Dudley Grange for meetings. The Fischer Institute of Nichols College has rented the facility for many guest speaker programs. The Tavern has also conducted community outreach by making the facility available to the Dudley Historical Commission for an informational meeting, the Dudley Board of Selectmen for their annual meeting on the Hill, and Dudley Boy Scout Troop 273 for the use of conducting five eagle-scout boards of review.

Several tours of this historical building have been conducted during the year as well. FYI should you ever wish to have a private tour of the Tavern our resident caretaker/innkeeper Bob Ducharme is always available to give tours. Just give him a call.

Another area of community outreach is the annual 3<sup>rd</sup> grade visit at the end of the school year when 4 busloads of students descend on Dudley Hill to visit the Tavern and learn what life was like back in the 1800’s.

Shortly after the kids’ visit, the Tavern is open for free guided tours at the Dudley Grange’s Annual Strawberry Festival. It’s always great to see the kids come back with their parents in tow so they can show them what they learned earlier in the month.

In addition to its use for rentals and meetings, the Tavern comes alive in the fall with our monthly speaker programs held on the third Thursday of each month.

Also this past fall we held for the first time a very successful Craft Fair in conjunction with the Grange’s Annual Apple Festival. We hope this will be an ongoing event in the future.

In order to keep the Tavern looking fresh for those who use it, we continue to make upgrades to the interior. This past year we completed a total renovation of the kitchen area, including additional cabinets made by Bob.

Several new pieces of furniture were also constructed for the hearth-room and the taproom. An additional air conditioner was added to make summer rentals more pleasant for those wishing to rent in warm weather. Finally, new chairs were purchased to replace those originally purchased during the Tavern renovation in the 1980’s.

The “Inkeepers” are beginning to book rentals for the 2014 season, so keep us in mind when you plan your next event.
