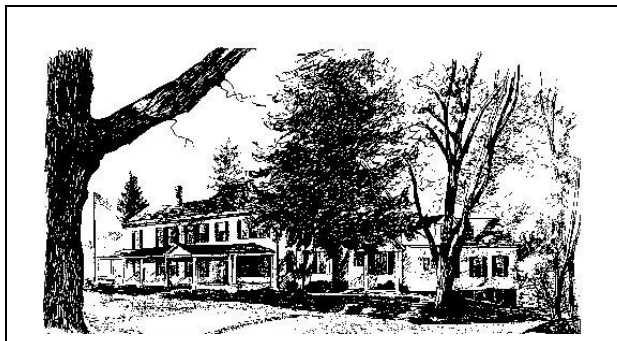

Message from the Chair

As I sit down to write my second
"Letter from the Chair," I'm filled
with pride and excitement. What
an extraordinary year we have had
at the Tavern! The energy,
commitment, and passion of our
members and volunteers have
made 2025 a year worth
celebrating. Thanks to your hard
work, from planning events and
programs to tackling maintenance
and major capital improvements,
the Black Tavern Historical Society
continues to thrive, inspire, and
grow.

Our progress over the past few
years has been remarkable.
Generous financial support,
coupled with the tireless efforts of
so many dedicated individuals, has
allowed us to advance critical
restoration work, preserve our
historic structures, continue annual
events and expand the
opportunities we provide to our
community. However, in 2025, we
accomplished even more projects
than in years past, and the
momentum has been nothing short
of exhilarating. By the time winter
arrived, many of us felt ready for a
brief recharge, but also deeply
proud of all that had been achieved
this past year.

None of our success would be
possible without the incredible

continued support of our members, corporate sponsors, local businesses, neighboring communities, and individuals who have made thoughtful bequests to ensure our future. Thank you to all of you for another truly outstanding year.

This past year's accomplishments were packed with meaningful progress and tangible improvements that move the Tavern forward while honoring its history. Some of the major projects included window restoration where every re-glazed and freshly painted sash around the Tavern, Annex, and Barn stands as a symbol of our commitment to preservation. The Barn siding was beautified and protected by applying a fresh coat of oil finish on the siding. Heating & cooling upgrades included new split-system units in the Tavern and Apartment to make these spaces more comfortable and efficient. Also, to further improve the Museum Room (and after many years of being tabled) the Museum Room was enhanced by adding damp-proofing and insulating to the crawl space below, taking yet another vital step in safeguarding our treasured collections.

Other exciting updates to the Tavern included a newly paved parking area for serving the Apartment, a new handsome split-rail fence accenting the Tavern's south side, tree work around the property, and ongoing restoration of a donated 19th-century bench. There were also countless behind-the-scenes repairs and improvements handled with care by the Tavern's caretaker,

Bob Ducharme.

Our commitment to celebrating the heritage of the Tavern, Dudley, and surrounding communities remains at the heart of everything we do, and 2025 brought so many reasons to celebrate our accomplishments throughout the year including; engaging monthly programs and special events, the annual third-grade educational tours, The Chris Ducharme Food Share Program, Scholarship award, funding from the Janet Malser Humanities Trust and private tours of the Tavern.

The annual Craft Fair, led by Board member Deborah Bazinet, was yet again an overwhelming success. The beautiful weather was a bonus—but the thriving crowd and warm community atmosphere were the real celebrations.

This year also brought meaningful transitions and heartfelt appreciation for years of service on the Board and wish to recognize a few Board members. Nancy Roy stepped down as Chair of the Membership Subcommittee after serving over 18 years of service! Fortunately, her son Scott Roy, stepped into Nancy's role seamlessly. Scott has also volunteered to become the assistant to our steadfast treasurer, Will Moseley, who continues to do an impeccable job with a sharp eye on the Tavern's finances. Tom Boyd, one of the Tavern's charter members, also stepped forward to lead the Finance Subcommittee and will continue to provide invaluable guidance and oversight.

Our biggest heartfelt news to

report is that after 24 years of Board membership and one of the longest standing members of the Board, Bob Ducharme will be stepping down as the Tavern's Caretaker. In 2009, Bob and his beloved wife, Chris, decided to move into the Tavern as tenants and continued over the years being the caretakers, voice and face of the Tavern. Bob and Chris were not only responsible for taking on the yearly maintenance of the Tavern's building and grounds, which included fertilizing and maintaining the beautiful lawns and gardens, snow removal, coordinating many contracted projects and self-performed repairs, creating a Civil War Room, Bob and Chris also took on many other important roles, including chairing 4 of 7 committees, booking, setting up and cleaning up of all the rental events, the Annual Craft Fair, yard sales, and coordinating the annual 3rd grade visits. On top of all this Bob oversaw the annual Newsletter and was the coordinator of the many speaker programs. Fortunately, for all of us, Bob will continue as a Board member and a steward for our "Gem on the Hill!" With all that Bob has accomplished over the years, it is clear that Bob is one of a kind and it will be hard to find someone with such skill and passion to step into Bob's shoes! All of the Board and Tavern members are deeply grateful to Bob and wish him all the best in the days to come!

Looking ahead, and as we celebrate all that 2025 brought, we also look ahead to another year full of promise. The Tavern's success is

only possible because of the strength and spirit of our community, and we continue to welcome new members and new ideas.

Caretaker's Report

In 2025, many upgrades identified as needed to be done to the Tavern infrastructure by the long-range planning committee were completed. This past year, 2025, we concentrated in attempting to complete the list of tasks yet needed to be done.

In late January we started by having splits installed in the apartment to assist in the antiquated heating system. Shortly thereafter, splits were also installed in the Tavern meeting room and the museum room. These upgrades will not only help with heating and cooling during functions and rentals, but will also provide climate control to remediate moisture in the museum room to protect our artifacts.

About the same time, we began

having all the original windows of the Tavern and apartment re-glazed and repainted. These original early 1800 windows had not had work done on them in over 40 years since the Tavern was restored during the 1980's. This was a monumental task, considering that most of the windows have twelve over twelve sashes in them. When you count them all up, it comes to over 1400 panes of glass, "YIKES!" Most of them the original 1804 era glass. Last year we had replaced the storm windows and this allowed us to remove the individual windows for re-glazing during the cooler weather. This work was done by painting contractor Misael Fossas.

Winter here at the Tavern is the time when unseen jobs get done. Things like buying new star-spangled banner flags for our flagpole, a new vacuum cleaner for maintenance of the Tavern, rearranging the museum room to make room for the split, having the lawn tractor serviced so it's ready for the spring mowing season, and repainting and remounting signs from around the Tavern.

In March we had the dirt crawl space under the museum room encapsulated and insulated. This will go along with the addition of the splits, to mitigate the moisture in that room so as to better protect our artifacts.

In April and May, SPRING IS COMING! Thank God the cold weather is gone. The job of the caretaker moves outside when lawns get thatched, raked, limed, fertilized, rototilled where needed, and reseeded. Flowers get planted and geraniums get hung on the front

porch, and all the rocking chairs get placed on the front porch as well. Time had taken its toll on our sign post located in front of the barn. The post held a reproduction sign of "Healey's Inn" created by Deb Bazinet. The post was in danger of falling down and we decided to take it down before someone got hurt. A team effort led by Marc Moseley, Scott Roy and Bob Grzyb cut down the old post and removed the concrete base then disposed of the material. At the same time the "crew" cut down and removed a diseased elm tree located in the same area. Dave Proulx, "our 19th century expert woodworker" plans to rebuild a new post in the spring.

In August new fencing, to replace two old and broken fences, was installed on the Tanyard Rd. side of the Tavern. Bob Ducharme completed the restoration of an antique bench that was donated to the Tavern last year. The Annex, the yellow building between the barn and Tavern, has been scrapped and repainted. All windows of the barn and annex have been reglazed and painted. The entire barn and back of Annex has been power-washed and sealed with an oil stain. The posts and ceiling trim located outside in back of the barn have been scrapped and painted.

In October our electrician Brian Benoit continued upgrading electrical outlets in the taproom and museum room and began outdoor lighting upgrades by adding new sensor lights. At the same time, we have discussed possible security camera locations.

Looking back at what we have accomplished over the last year and a half, as stewards of this "Gem on the Hill", I think **WE SHOULD BE PROUD.**

The bench is from the Morristown New Jersey area and most recently was on the Truby porch near the common in Woodstock, Ct. Major restoration work has been beautifully handcrafted by Bob Ducharme and it is now ready for its final decorative touch by artist Deborah Bazinet, with her signature scenes of Dudley Hill on the back panels. It will be the Tavern's contribution to the 250th Anniversary of the USA in July.

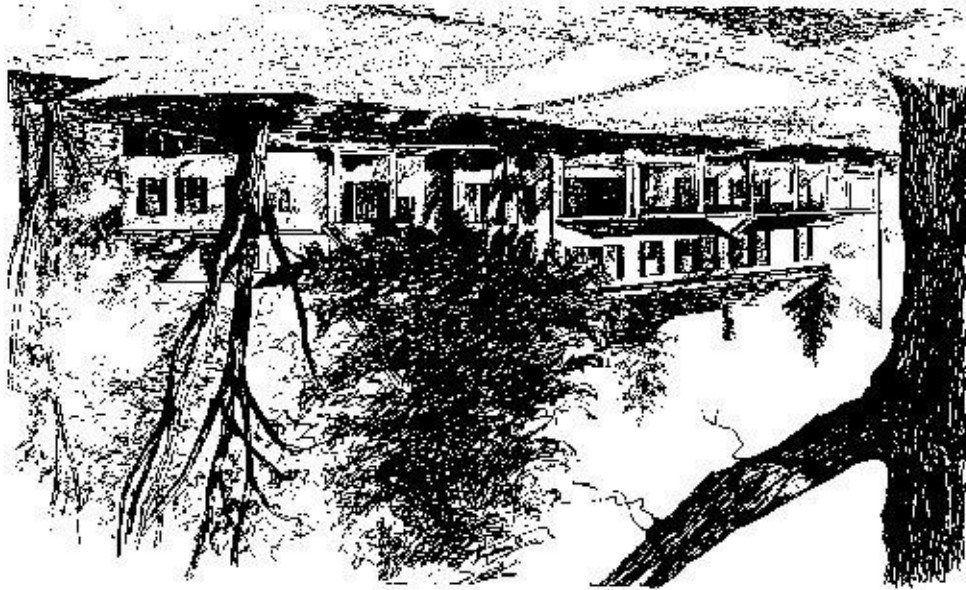
